Modern Classic – Plain frame and plain door

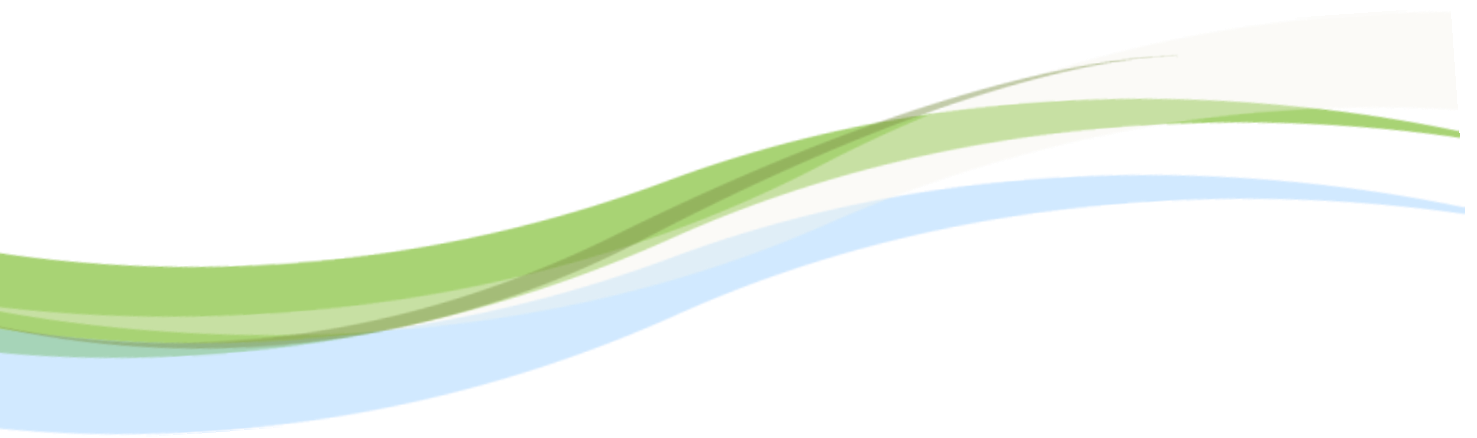

P2 Plinth – with legs visible

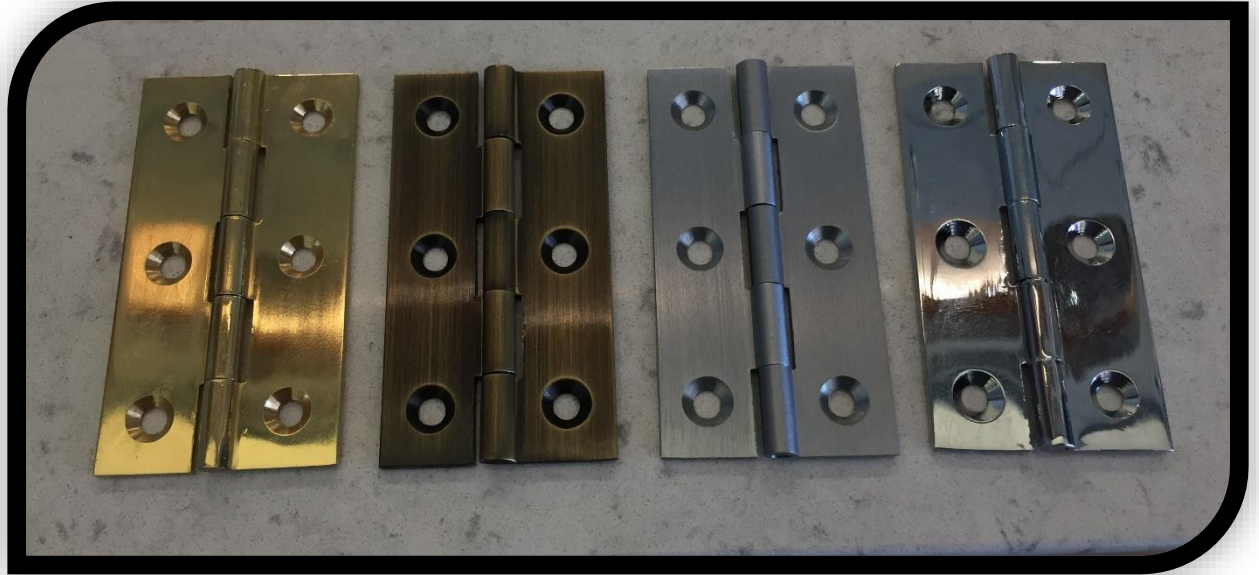


P3 Plinth – No legs

Notes & Advice – If your floor is not level we would NOT recommend P2 plinth as it can look like the legs are floating of the floor dips

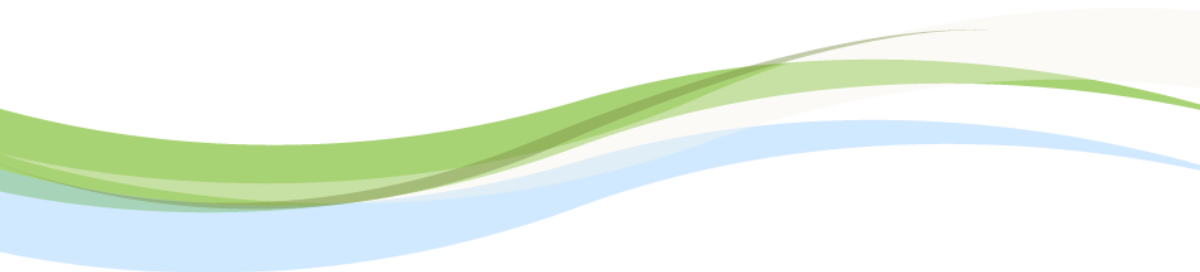


Plain Glazed

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Painted Finish



Raw – Unfinished – Needs Priming, Oiling and painting on site one fitted



Primed & Oiled – Pre primed and internally oiled – ready to be fitted and then final top coat of paint on site



Spray Painted – Spray painted to a colour of your choice and oiled ready to be fitted

Notes and advice – Our recommendation is to hand paint your kitchen on site once fitted, there are several reasons for this, occasionally accidents happen on site and a fitter can damage a cupboard moving it or fitting it, to touch up a spray painted product is not the easiest and can be difficult to do well. Handpainting gives more flexibility and if any damage occurs during fitting or later is easy to touch up
